In February after debuting at the Canberra Womens Pro 1 then reaching the Quarter finals at Canberra Women's Pro 2, long term RHTC member 16yr old **Sophie McDonald** earned a WTA womens world doubles ranking.

Sophie hit her 1st tennis balls at the Red Hill Tennis Club as a 5yr old in 2010 and became a proud **Red Hill 'Roo** pennant player in 2011 as a 6yr old and has been supported by the RHTC committee in her ACT primary school Bruce Cup trips to Albury (2015), Bendigo (2016) and Adelaide (2017). Club championships

The Red Hill Club Championships provided a feast of good tennis; tense contests; and some surprising results. With the weather kind to us, and an enthralled spectator crowd happily munching on sausages, a cleansing ale, a tipple of wine and the odd soft drink supplied by the Committee, the scene was set for a real showdown.

And the crowd was not disappointed.

The **junior boys**' singles was riveting, with **Logan Wicks** coming through in an exciting round robin tournament. Showing great pluck was the runner up, **Albi Arabzadeh**, who has come along in leaps and bounds, and will be a force to be reckoned with next year, for sure.

The men's doubles took us back in years, with nostalgia echoing through the club rooms, as another Shafron title was registered – this time, it was the wily experience and cunning of **Zac Shafron** who teamed up with another Club legend and stalwart, **David Kearns**. That combination was just too much at the end of the day for the nearest challengers, **Shane Douglas** and **Chris Chapman**. Nevertheless, Shane and Chris displayed some classy tennis, and there were moments when we thought we were watching an earlier version of the Woodies – such was the empathy and intuition of that team in action.

The women's singles was one of the surprise packages of the tournament. A late influx of entries energised the draw, and suddenly, the crowd knew they were witnessing something momentous – perhaps the arrival of a new, unheralded champion? As the sets progressed, the tension was building, and then suddenly, it was coming down to the final round of the round robin to reveal whose name would be etched onto the hallowed honour roll in the Clubhouse. The end result was a victory for experience and hard training – Tuesday after Tuesday of social tennis had honed the skills and determination of **Femke Rensen**, who prevailed in a thrilling finale. The challenger and runner up, seemingly coming from nowhere (in fact she came from Melbourne) was **Sarah McConville**. She could be one to watch in future years – with youth on her side, a gritty defence and a penetrating forehand – surely next year she will go deep into the drawmaybe a future champion?

Which then brings us to the men's singles. The tension was palpable, the shots flowed freely with skill and panache; and the players were playing as if their life and reputations depended on the outcome - even though everyone would maintain that it was just for "fun". The seeded players logically progressed through the drawer, although possibly Zac might have felt a little hard done by to be edged out by a 56-year-old journeyman, Ian McConville, who had one of the sets of his life. Nevertheless, lan's run was to come to a screaming halt in the next round when his son, the 2020 champion, Kieren McConville, extinguished any chance of a Ken Rosewall type resurgence for the old fellow. With David Kearns sailing through his side of the drawer, the scene was set for a rematch of the epic 2020 finale – Kieren, the reigning champion, versus David – hoping to wrest back the elusive crown that he has made his own on two previous occasions, most recently in 2012. David knows that this is the long game. To say this was a David and Goliath struggle might be overstating it, but it was certainly in the epic zone. Matt, as referee and umpire but also coach and trainer for both these players, knew this was going to be a tough one. At times, he could barely bear to watch, such was the conflicted emotions he must have felt to see these two players bludgeon the ball to all ends of the court; extracting every last drop of blood from the court and their bodies, in order to secure the title. But it was David that drew first blood, securing the first set. The crowd would not be wrong if they were sensing that it was going to be the day for the challenger – but the game was only half done. With the wine flowing at the Club house, there were some that were clearly hoping for a contest, a thrilling three setter, perhaps long enough to order another drop of Dan's Club wine to savour the occasion. But David secured an early break in the second set, and the crowd could see the nails being hammered into the coffin, one by one, but steadily. And thus it happened – David Kearns, a worthy champion, taking back at long last, the coveted Red Hill Men's Single title for 2021.

One thing we can say – the Championships produced tales of heroism, courage and skill. Passion was there in abundance, and no one left the court or the Club House without feeling a deep satisfaction at their efforts, and the enjoyment of the occasion. A special thanks to Tournament Director Matt for crafting and overseeing yet another epic tournament, and to the Red Hill Tennis Committee for staging the event.

Court care and replacement



Clay court replacement

We are making our first steps to upgrading our clay courts to a hard all-weather surface. We have started discussions with Tennis ACT and a court building company. We received a rough quote of **\$52,000 per court** subject to the subsurface of the clay courts.

We arranged for cores to be sunk in both courts to find out what we were dealing with. The results have passed onto the court builders.

You can see we have a big job fund raising to enable us to make the hard courts a reality. Once we have sufficient seed capital we will seek grants from the ACT Government and Tennis Australia. Grass court maintenance

You may have noticed the grass courts are looking great. This is because we've had them serviced with sand added and repairs done where necessary. Getting regular maintenance on the grass courts keeps them playing well and extends the life of the synthetic grass.

The MPIO is the first point of contact for members with a concern or complaint about discrimination, harassment and child protection issues. The MPIO is not a complaints officer and can't take a side, but by helping make sure communication goes to the right place at the beginning, problems can be solved more effectively for everyone involved.

RHTC wants to support all our members in the best way possible. We also want to raise awareness about respectful and safe behaviour for members while we are participating in RHTC activities.

Around the clubhouse you might see posters about the Tennis Australia *Safeguarding Children Code of Conduct* to give members some information about this important initiative.
