Note from the President

As of 5 June 2017 we now have an online booking system live at Turner Tennis Club! What a momentous event – I want to thank those Committee members and club members who have put an incredible amount of volunteer hours into getting this system off the ground and ensuring members and non-members are well supported in the transition.

We are now one of 13 clubs in the ACT to have adopted Tennis Australia's Book a Court.

Consistent with our club lease conditions, the Committee made the decision to get on board to make our courts more accessible to our local community as well as members. The system will make it easier to book and play at night and the club will benefit from having hire fees paid up front, rather than randomly physically collected under the old system. We hope to see improved court hire revenue for the club which is important for our continued viability.

Of course, there have been frustrating aspects in the implementation and some will continue to be addressed, but we have made a good decision for the future of the club.

I want to acknowledge the sad passing of Alan Richardson, a long term member in the past of our club. Annette his wife was our President for many years and is a life member. Alan is remembered for his dedication to the club, its members and tennis. Many remember him as a wonderful gentleman. We offer our condolences to his family and friends.

Also in this newsletter we are able to report on club upgrade progress, our recent Trivia Night, Haig Park development community consultations and recent discussions with Tennis Act about future club support.

Book-A-Court - Online Court Booking System

On Monday 5th June 2017 we went live with Tennis Australia's Book-A-Court (BAC). This online system controls bookings and access for members and non-members. You can find all you need to know at:

With the introduction of Book-A-Court access is gained by PIN entry at the gate. Access by padlock key will be maintained for a short transitional period at the gate on the eastern side of the clubhouse, but key hire for access and lights is no longer applicable.

Hire via the Capital Chemist at O'Connor is therefore no longer available. An arrangement for help with online bookings at the Rugby Union Club (RUC) over the road from TTC is under discussion.

Haig Park

TTC has been consulted in relation to the Haig Park master planning currently underway. We look forward to being a part of the development of this unique and amazing green space in Canberra's north.

Mike Taverner, TTC Committee member, recently attended a speaker's forum at the RUC and offers this reflection.

Did you know that all sulphur crested cockatoos are left handed? This is just one thing I learned from the ACT Government's speaker's forum on Haig Park.

As you are probably aware, Haig Park is the subject of much discussion by government and community groups. As leaseholders in the Park, your tennis club committee has maintained an involvement in discussions on the future of the Park. The RUC event was not specifically about the development of a new Management Plan, but it was an opportunity for the community to learn more about this important piece of Canberra.

I learned that the Canberra climate is changing. The global changes are reflected at a local level with a greater number of extreme heat events in which the maximum temperatures are increasing. It was stated however, that the trees in Haig Park are at no imminent threat from this – although its tennis players might be!

The Park was described as a 'biodiversity desert'. There is little food or habitat for wildlife although the Park is home to up to 12 species of parrots – eating acorns and digging onion grass. And of course there is our Powerful Owl who is

conveniently located between Mt Ainslie and Black Mountain to hunt his fill of ring-tailed possums and the like.

Have you heard of the Canberra Nature Map? It is an amazing site that enables you to find what has been sighted in your locality – from birds, to wildlife, fungi, arthropods etc., or, if you wanted to follow a particular species, this is also possible. Check it out - <http://canberra.naturemapr.org/>

An intrinsic feature of our Park is the 14 rows of trees. In 1921 there were just 12 rows of trees planted as a wind-break for the city. But in the 1950's, well-known forester Lindsay Prior planted an extra row on either side. There were originally 7,653 trees planted and now there are just over 2,300. The government has a like-for-like replacement policy and is working its way through the 23 species currently planted. The pin oaks are becoming rot affected and are being replaced; the big Lombardy Poplars are on the weed list and they'll be going soon. Pines have dominated the planting and re-planting over the years and many of these plantations now need thinning.

The photinias that surround our fences have survived as an original understory. The government tree-boss confirmed that as leaseholders, we are responsible for the maintenance of these.

Haig Park was not part of Walter Burley Griffin's original plan – it was the Federal Capital Advisory Commission who drew a green line of the map that led to our current Park. The trees seem to be the major heritage value of the Park and the new Management Plan is grappling with preserving these whilst increasing the recreational value of the Park.
