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Redevelopment Update – Take a Look at Us Now



Wow! 12 new red porous courts; 4 of them international size (to add to the 2 existing ones), completely revamped clubhouse, new fencing and paths and so much more. We have finally done it. Commenced in 2018 our redevelopment is now almost completed. RALCON Commercial have completed our clubhouse and surrounds, concreted the last path and (almost) hung the last gate. ET Richards & Sons have laid the court surface and installed the lines and rolled each new court over 20 times. We are good to play tennis. How good is that?





Good things come to those that work.

The culmination of this project is the collective work of many people.

It started in the early 1970's when our then committee chose this magnificent site to relocate to from their Marley Street courts, it continued with a very ambitious plan in 2008 that, with an extraordinary amount of hard work by many people, has resulted in what we see today.

What we now have is unique in country Victoria, if not in all of regional Australia. To have 14 first class red porous courts, including 6 international size courts, is amazing. Our Clubhouse is now state of the art and we are now fully accessible, inside and out. To have all of this in a spectacular setting beside 2 lakes and within the Stephenson Park precinct is an absolute tribute to all those involved.

We have received financial support from the State Governments Latrobe Valley Authority's Latrobe Valley Sports and Community Initiative Fund, the Federal Governments Local Roads and Community Infrastructure Fund, Wellington Shire, The John Leslie Foundation and Tennis Australia along with a substantial contribution from our Club reserves. Without the collective support of each of these funders our project could not have proceeded.



The support from the State Government for our project has been visionary from the time of the announcement in 2018. Since then Laurie Paton from the Latrobe Valley Authority has been our “sea of tranquillity” providing calm guidance as we have worked our way through the project.

Mick Meyer from Sport and Recreation Victoria has been a true believer in our project for the best part of a decade. He has been a “steady hand on the tiller” for all that time. He has helped us navigate through various funding applications, soothed our nerves when we were not successful and encouraged us to keep pushing forward. Mick is an outstanding advocate for sport in Gippsland.

There are not enough accolades for the work of The John Leslie Foundation. During his lifetime John was a wonderful supporter of, not only our Club, but the whole Wellington Shire community. His legacy is the Foundation that bears his name and the current board have continued his amazing work impeccably. Without the support of the John Leslie Foundation we would not have even made it to the starting line. It is impossible to express our full gratitude for their support.

Local Federal Member Darren Chester has been a strong supporter of our Club over a long period of time and was instrumental in sourcing funding through the Federal Governments Local Roads and Community Infrastructure Fund, an essential component of our Stage 2 funding. (It is possible we and our community value Darren more than his own political party.)

Wellington Shire should be justifiably proud of their support of sport in our district. They have worked tirelessly to fund and build within our Shire some of the best sporting facilities in regional Victoria. Sam Matthews from Wellington Shire was our day to day project manager. She has great attention to detail and weaved her way through funding agreements, plans, meetings and a myriad of other tasks.

Sam was assisted on site by Barry Waddell. Barry brings a wealth of experience to his works supervisor role and there seems to be little that surprises him. Importantly they both remained focused on getting the best outcomes for the Club. Our thanks goes to both Sam and Barry.

Tennis Victoria and Tennis Australia have been steadfast supporters, first Ken Barton and then Fiona Young, with a cameo from Lynton Franzl. The backing and input from our peak body was an essential ingredient in shaping this project and we look forward to their support in filling our new courts with happy players from all over the nation into the future.

Rod Centra and Andrew Stephenson from RALCON Commercial have been our construction project partners and they, along with a group of dedicated local sub-contractors, have shown the expertise that local contractors can bring to major projects.

Our new red porous court surface is world class thanks to the efforts of John, Ash and the team from ET Richards & Sons. This is a 4th generation business and their expertise with everything relating to the construction and maintenance of this surface is unrivalled in Australia. We are beyond grateful for their involvement in our project.

Mia Goold Wins Prestigious Rafa Nadal Tour Trophy

Sale Tennis Club junior Mia Goold has been awarded a prestigious Rafa Nadal Tour Trophy of Values.

The Rafa Nadal Academy is a junior tennis circuit launched in Spain in 2014 by tennis legend, Rafael Nadal. It has a strong focus on sport and education combining the tournament aspect with dynamic and fun educational activities for the players aiming to establish strong fundamental values.

Leading 12 & Under and 14 & Under juniors from all over Victoria gathered at Beaumaris Lawn Tennis Club from 3rd to 6th July to compete in the singles tournament and participate in the off court personal development activities.

During each tournament there are numerous fun learning activities run by the mentors from the Rafa Nadal Tour, focusing on the four key values of the circuit: Sportsmanship, Commitment, Fellowship and Effort.

The four key values are defined as;

1. Sportsmanship is the appropriate and correct behaviour during the practice of any sport, as well as the acceptance of adverse situations willingly.
2. Commitment is the players' capacity to acknowledge, get involved and accomplish something that has been previously agreed to.
3. Fellowship is the friendly and collaborative relationship between different people, which is defined by solidarity, sympathy, generosity, respect.
4. Effort is the capacity to work with discipline, to accomplish the obligations and to behave with perseverance to improve oneself.

The personal development sessions are in the form of classroom activities with group work and physical activity sessions in pairs and teams.

The eight winning players from each 12 & Under & 14 & Under singles events held as well as eight selected winners of the Trophy of Values progress to the end of circuit Australian Masters event.

Mia was selected as the winner of the Trophy of Values which recognises a player from each event that shows a positive attitude and behaviour on and off the court.

The Trophy of Values aims to recognize and reward those players at the Rafa Nadal Tour events who put into practice the Rafa Nadal Tour values - positive values, attitudes and behaviours that are essential to helping the players' relevant personal and athletic development. The Academy facilitators and coaches on site observe all players both on court and during the values activities.

The Rafa Nadal Tour Australian Masters event is scheduled to be held in Melbourne in January 2022 in the lead up to the Australian Open. A maximum of sixteen players will be invited to compete in each of the 12 & Under and 14 & Under boys and girls Masters event.



Mia has had an outstanding 2021 already. In March she won the Paul Egan Award at the Sale Tennis Club, the Club award for the most outstanding junior from the Sale WGTA junior teams.

Mia has also been selected in the Gippsland Sports Academy tennis squad. Gippsland Sports Academy offers talented Gippsland athletes the opportunity to reach their full potential in their chosen sport by providing services such as advanced technical coaching and sport science programs covering strength and conditioning, psychology, nutrition and hydration and personal development sessions.

Mia was also the Runner-Up in the School Sport Victoria - Primary Girls Tennis Tournament in the Victoria wide event and has since been invited to participate in the training and selection day to determine the final State primary school squad.

Sale Tennis Club Hosts 2022 AO Ballkids Trials

Sale Tennis Club hosted its 5th annual Ballkid Trial on Sunday as part of the selection process for Australian Open Ballkids for the AO in 2022.

The trials are normally conducted in March each year but the scheduling was impacted by the AO being held later than normal this year and COVID restrictions, with several new dates having to be set. Metropolitan trials are still yet to be held.

COVID restrictions meant that metropolitan children could not travel to regional areas so the 2 aspiring ballkids who were able to attend got very special attention.

The ballkid hopefuls were put through their paces by Club Professional Coach, Anthony Zafiris and 4 times AO ballkid and Sale Tennis Club player, Hunter Pearce. This combination of coaching and recent ballkid experience made for a very successful trial.

The Level 1 Trial for the AO Ballkids Program is designed to identify children with skills in the areas of rolling, servicing and court movement, all of which are critical to the overall function of the ballkid on court, so these skills were the focus of the trials.

Ballkids play an integral role in ensuring that tennis tournaments run smoothly. Throughout the Australian Open series, each ballkid is a focal part of every game, be it at Rod Laver Arena or an outside court.

The Australian Open Ballkids Program has one of the most intensive training programs of the four Grand Slams and focuses on the development of core skills and overall tennis knowledge, whilst also encouraging team work, communication and leadership amongst participants.

Applicants who rank within the top 400 performers Australia wide at the Level 1 Trials will be invited to attend Level 2 trials where they will again be assessed for the opportunity to join the AO Ballkids Training Program. A total of 310 ballkids will be chosen for AO 2022.

Tennis Australia is extremely proud of our Australian Open Ballkids, who are consistently recognised as the highest quality ballkids of the four Grand Slam events. This reputation is attributed to the rigorous selection process and intensive training program that leads into each January.

Sale Tennis Club is hopeful of hosting many more ballkid hopefuls in its next annual trials assuming that we are without the disruption of COVID restrictions in 2022.

Fast 4 Fun At Sale Tennis Club

The first Sale Tennis Club Fast 4 Challenge season for 2021 finished in June after four rounds of fabulous Fast 4 tennis. 8 teams competed in the modified game format with each team playing 3 sets of Fast 4 tennis each night. Teams were made up of workmates, social clubs and groups of friends, who all enjoyed the fun atmosphere.

The 4 rounds of tennis unfortunately spanned over 8 weeks with COVID restrictions and then floods causing delays. However this did not dampen the enthusiasm of the teams who turned up rain, hail or shine to take the court, socialise and enjoy the sausages fresh from the BBQ.

After the 4 rounds were finally completed "Tennis Tragics", made up of Jo Rule, Jo MacTier and Prue McNaughton, were declared the winners. They will enjoy a fabulous night at Graze Family Bistro for their efforts.

The shortened format offers a "fast" alternative, with only four points, four games and four rules: there are no advantage scores, lets are played, tie-breakers apply at three games all and the first to four games wins the set. It has been described as the tennis equivalent of the Twenty20 format of cricket.

The shortened game format provided an exciting and much quicker variation on traditional tennis, with each set limited to about 20 minutes. The Fast 4 Challenge catered for players of all standards, from beginners to seasoned campaigners. There was a very popular weekly prize with the support of Graze Family Bistro and AO merchandise for the lucky winners.

Following the success of this Fast 4 Challenge we will now try to schedule another challenge in Term 4 if COVID allows. Players can be from businesses, families and friends or just put your individual name down and you will be put into a team. Prior tennis experience is not needed. We can cater for all abilities so long as you are prepared to have fun. Families and new players are especially welcome.

Our featured volunteer this newsletter is Murray Fitzclarence.

“Muzz” joined the General Committee in 1993 and was Vice President in 1994, 1995, 1996, 1997 and 1998 before stepping off committee. He re-joined the General Committee in 2004 and has served continuously since and has been Vice-President for the last 2 years. He was also our Club Captain in 1995 and for 6 years from 2004 to 2009.

Muzz also was actively involved with the Pro Circuit events from 2006 to 2008 taking on various roles from bus driver to caterer. His calm and practical nature allowed him to mix comfortably with the international players and the tournament staff and nothing was too much trouble.

Sale Tennis Club Coach, Anthony Zafiris, is bound for Brisbane where his wife Fiona is taking up a new senior medical consulting role. During his two years at Sale Tennis Club Anthony has transformed the coaching program into an elite academy with the outcomes now showing in tournament results for his coaching students around the State.

Anthony has been responsible for the significant expansion of the ANZ Hot Shots program, the introduction of cohesive junior squads with a focus on sound technique and elite skills, has developed an adult coaching program, has helped with the revival of the bi-annual Dahlsens Challenge with Bairnsdale Tennis Club in addition to his day to day coaching delivery to private students and schools.

In his two years at Sale Tennis Club Anthony won the Men's Singles title at the Club Championships both years, bringing a standard of singles play never before seen on the Sale courts. He was also our Sale Tennis Club male Player of the Year in season 2019/20.

Tennis Victoria Volunteers Lunch

John Ruskin, the 19th century English industrialist and philanthropist, theorised that “*There is no such thing as a free lunch.*” However in late May Tennis Victoria tested this theory with a Volunteers Lunch at Leonda by the Yarra in Hawthorn.

Volunteers from all over the State were treated to lunch and some tennis and sporting insights from Craig Tiley, the CEO of Tennis Australia and Director of the Australian Open and Olympic and Commonwealth Games legend, Steve Moneghetti.

Craig Tiley spoke on the challenges of delivering the AO during a pandemic and the issues that were faced both on and off the court in the lead up to and during the event. Issues such as players agreeing to lockdown, organising practice sessions during isolation, the public perception issues of players entering Australia from over 32 different countries, the snap 5 day lockdown in the middle of the event which cost the AO over \$35 million and planning for AO 2022 were all discussed.

Steve Moneghetti recounted his beginnings in long distance running and the fact that he was not considered to be a good runner in primary school. When attempting to join Little Athletics, his father was told that he was not wanted. He recovered from this early rebuff however to win many events including the 1994 Tokyo Marathon and the marathon at the Commonwealth Games in the same year in Victoria, Canada and competed in the marathon at four Olympic Games; 1988 in Seoul, 1992 in Barcelona, 1996 in Atlanta and 2000 in Sydney. His best performance in the Olympics was 5th place at Seoul in 1988.

In 2010 he was the Australian team's *chef de mission* for the 2010 Commonwealth Games in Delhi, India. This role was responsible for many humorous stories but what happens in Delhi stays in Delhi.

Sale TC was represented by Robin and Joan Lowe who were happy to have a day out to mix with a bunch of happy volunteers in between COVID lockdowns.

Why is *any* of this even remotely important you ask? Well our Club was lucky enough to win a Nespresso Coffee Machine at the recent Tennis Victoria Volunteers lunch.

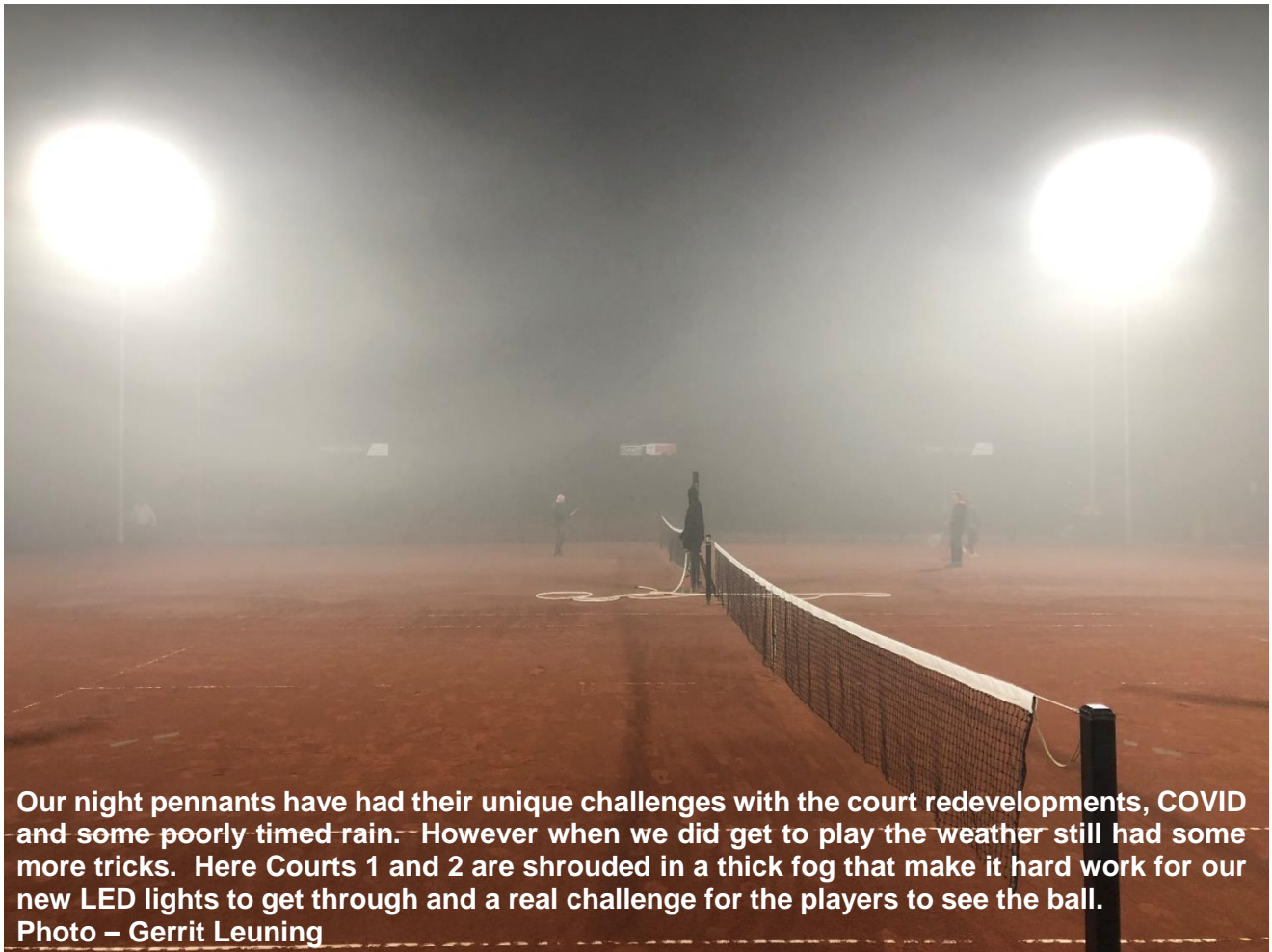
All coffee machines require two fundamental ingredients: coffee and water. Extraction is the process of extracting flavour from ground coffee. When hot water comes into contact with ground coffee, the chemical compounds and oils that give coffee its flavour dissolve and ride along with the water until they wind up in your cup, where you can enjoy them.

Nespresso machines use a process that they've dubbed "Centrifusion", which works by rapidly spinning ground coffee and water at 7,000 revolutions per minute to mix them evenly. The result is an extremely even extraction that can produce espresso-like crema without a high-pressure environment.

Now that you know all that, it is time to sit back and smell the coffee. Enjoy!!
